The **20th Update in Travel Medicine and Global Health Update** brought together clinicians, researchers, and public health professionals to explore the latest developments in global infectious diseases, travel-related health risks, and immunization strategies.

👥 Who Attended

This year's conference drew a diverse mix of professionals:

- Physicians: 64 (27 virtual, 22 in-person, 15 faculty)
- Nurses & Nurse Practitioners: 18
- Physician Associates & Pharmacists: 6
- Students & Others: 6

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Attendees joined from across the U.S., with the highest representation from:

- Washington State: 45 attendees
- California: 5
- Minnesota: 2
- Others from Ohio, New Jersey, North Carolina, Arizona, Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Canada (AB)

Participants raised thoughtful and timely questions, including:

- Does showering after swimming reduce the risk of schistosomiasis?
- Should geriatric patients be retested for Hepatitis B immunity?
- Why isn't there more transparency around vaccine NNT/NNH data?
- Are additional measles boosters recommended after three doses?

Despite the complexity of global health challenges, the conference fostered a collaborative and inquisitive environment, reinforcing the importance of evidence-based practice in travel medicine.
